Stay safe

Road safety is a skill for life

Your child has recently taken part in a road safety awareness session. They have learnt about how they can stay safe when travelling to school. There are some things you can do to help.

Follow the advice in this leaflet and share the key messages with your child/children.

Today's young pedestrians will one day become drivers and riders.

Together we can help keep them safe now and make them better and safer road users in the future.

Be a positive role model

Children learn more from your driving behaviour than you think.



As adults, you can demonstrate a safe, positive attitude both behind the wheel and as a passenger.

Walking to school

- Adults are taller and so it's easier to see dangers. Take the time to teach children road safety at every opportunity.
- Wear something bright so you can be seen clearly from a distance.
- Stay away from the kerb. If possible let children walk on the inside, the furthest away from the road. On narrow pavements keep children in front of you not running ahead or trailing behind.
- Only scooter where it is safe. Children should stay close and listen for instructions you may see dangers they haven't.
- Wear a safety helmet. They offer extra protection on bicycles and scooters.
- Use the zebra crossing. Teach children to wait a safe distance from the kerb until they can cross with an adult.

Driving to school

- Slow down! Respect the speed limits and only travel at that speed if it is safe to do so. Children can help look out for important signs so you can stay safe and avoid a fine.
- Set a good example. Wear your seat belt and make sure everyone else in the car does so also.
- Don't become distracted by mobile phones or other passengers.

Things you should know

We nearly all use a car to get us around every day. Think how your life might change if you lost your licence because you didn't know the law.

Speed limits

- Every public road has a maximum speed limit. It is the maximum speed and not the speed that is always safe to drive at.
- Always drive responsibly within your capabilities, that of the vehicle and according to the weather conditions.

Winter conditions

- The journey to school or work should take longer in the winter. In wet or wintery conditions the car may take over three times longer to stop.
- Drive more slowly in the winter and remember you may need to leave home earlier. The children have been encouraged to help by getting ready more quickly, packing their bags and cleaning their shoes the night before.
- Icy windscreens take time to clean. Make sure your car windows are clear to avoid collisions or the risk of a fine.

Large vehicles

Large vehicles have different speed limits to cars and motorcycles. Over a certain weight they can only travel at a maximum speed of 50mph on a single carriageway road. Don't get frustrated – relax, drop back and be patient.

Car seats

Everyone must wear a seat belt when travelling by car, unless exempt. Children under the age of 12 and under 135cm tall must also use a suitable car seat. If you are unsure of the requirements or how to fit a child seat correctly get advice, don't risk injury or prosecution. Set an example every time you get into a car; seat belts save lives and should be 'second nature' when travelling by car.

Mobile telephones

Mobile phones and other distractions contribute to road accidents. Don't risk an accident happening to you or losing your licence. Turn your phone onto silent and let the answer phone take a message. Even using a hands free phone greatly increases your chance of having an accident.

Keep safe – drive legal







Lorry safety




If you hear any of these, get out of the way.
